

NATIONAL MEMORIAL CEMETERY OF ARIZONA HISTORY

In 1926, Mr. Ivan Williams a long-time member of the American Legion contacted U.S. Senator Henry F. Ashurst about another National Veterans' Cemetery in Arizona. In the following years hundreds of veterans joined in the effort to accomplish this task, but their efforts were in vain due to the fact that the National Cemetery in Prescott was still open for burials.

In 1970, Department Commanders of the three major Veterans Service Organizations, with the full support of their predecessors and membership, pledged to establish a State Veterans Cemetery to become a National Cemetery.

A corporation was formed to acquire land for this purpose. Phoenix attorney Anthony O. Jones was named the corporation attorney responsible for drafting the petition and guiding it through proper channels. Land Commissioner Andrew L. Bettwy diligently worked with the corporate leaders. A section of land was eventually located in Phoenix at Cave Creek and Pinnacle Peak Roads, deemed acceptable on a lease fee basis.

The commanders presented the information to their organizations. They requested approval for an obligation of the organizations to pay lease fees on the full section of land while seeking a governing authority.

A State Law was passed in 1976 and signed by Governor Raul Castro authorizing the development of up to 640 acres for a Veterans Cemetery with \$50,000 appropriated. Seventeen acres of the leased land were conveyed to the Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES), with 12 and a half acres to be developed initially.

The Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery was dedicated on December 9, 1978, with the first burials occurring on March 14, 1979. Funds of \$291,700 were received from the U. S. Veterans' Administration Federal-State Matching Funds Grant Program for construction improvements. The State Legislature created the Arizona Veterans' Service Commission (AVSC) in 1982, and the cemetery operation was transferred to AVSC from DES.

In 1985, an additional two hundred twelve acres were conveyed to the AVSC, bringing the cemetery acreage to 225 acres. In 1988 the legislature appropriated \$300,000 for capital improvements, and additional modifications were authorized and completed through donated funds from veterans, fraternal, and other service organizations.

The cemetery with burial space available for 200,000 graves was transferred to the Veterans Cemetery Administration on April 1, 1989. The three Department Commanders were Disabled American Veterans Commander George E. Egel, Veterans of Foreign Wars Commander Charles "Chuck" G. Hastings, and American Legion Commander James J. Murphy.

The National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona will not reach capacity until well after 2030. The Department of Veterans Affairs spent over \$13 million on improvements in 1999. The project included three new committal shelters, a maintenance building, a visitor center, a founders plaza, an assembly area, columbaria, and extensive landscaping.

Monuments and Memorials

There are 18 monuments and memorials at the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona, most arranged along a memorial walkway. Two unique memorials at the cemetery are the Eternal Flame monument, which is pyramidal, and the World War II Submarine Torpedo monument.

National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona, Director Randy Heard

Randy Heard was named Director of the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona (NMCA) in Phoenix, Arizona, effective February 28, 2021. As Director, he is responsible for the oversight of all burial, maintenance, and administrative operations at the cemetery. Mr. Heard is also the Director overseeing Prescott National Cemetery operations in Prescott, Arizona.

Before his leadership in Arizona, Heard was the Director of Bakersfield National Cemetery in Arvin, California. He began his career with the National Cemetery Administration (NCA) in February 2009 at Riverside National Cemetery as a Cemetery Caretaker. He was promoted to Cemetery Caretaker Leader in May 2010 and again to Cemetery Caretaker Supervisor in September 2010.

Before joining NCA, Heard retired after serving more than 20 years in the United States Navy. He served in Operations Desert Shield, Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom. In the Navy, he served as an Aircraft Director/Aircraft Handler, Aircraft Rescue, Firefighting and Salvage Specialist, and Law Enforcement Specialist.

Governor Katie Hobbs

Governor Katie Hobbs was elected on November 15, 2022, as Arizona's 24th governor. As a social worker and manager of a domestic violence shelter, Governor Hobbs saw firsthand the price Arizonans pay when their elected leaders fail to address the problems people face daily. Frustrated with the lack of leadership, Governor Hobbs decided to run for office as an elected official. She used her experience as a social worker to take on Arizona's toughest challenges.

She worked with both parties in the legislature to expand health care to over 500,000 Arizonans. She worked across the aisle to find new ways to tackle the growing opioid epidemic here in Arizona.

When Governor Hobbs became Secretary of State in 2018, she modernized the office, fixed broken systems, battled misinformation, and navigated the pandemic.

She attended Northern Arizona University and graduated from Arizona State University with a master's degree in Social Work. She is a mother to Sam and Hanna and is a native Arizonan, having been born in Tempe.

Marshall Trimble, U.S. Marine Corps Veteran, State Historian, Author and Singer

In February 1957, Marshall Trimble joined the United States Marine Corps. Inspired by a Marine buddy, he purchased his first guitar in 1958 and taught himself to play while listening to records by Johnny Cash, Elvis, and Buddy Holly.

After discharge from the Marines, Trimble went to college and graduated from Arizona State University in 1961. Two years later, he was touring with the Gin Mill Three, a folk group performing Kingston Trio-inspired music. During his travels, he visited a variety of historical sites and museums. While visiting the Little Big Horn Battlefield in Montana in 1968, Trimble decided to become a Western historian and writer.

In 1972, Trimble was entrusted with a significant task-to create an Arizona history class at Scottsdale Community College. His dedication and expertise quickly made the class one of the largest at the college . In 1977, he took on the role of director of the school's Southwest Studies program, further enriching the educational landscape. His unique approach to promoting his first book in 1977, using his guitar and songs, added a lively touch to promotional book readings.

Trimble's contributions have not gone unnoticed. His work has been celebrated with numerous honors. In 1997, Governor Fife Symington bestowed upon him the title of Official State Historian. In 2000, he was chosen as one of Arizona's representatives in the Library of Congress "Local Legacies," a testament to the impact of his work.



Diana Pike



Keynote Speaker, U.S. Army (Ret.) Sergeant First Class Diana Pike

Sergeant First Class Diana Pike, a beacon of resilience, retired from the Army in 1988 after serving in Signal Intelligence.

In 1993, a tragic car accident left Diana without the love of her life, Michael, and fending on her own to raise two young children, Christian and Denise. Pike, a mother driven by a fierce dedication, ensured her son and daughter were well educated. Her daughter Denise, a testament to her mother's commitment, went to Xavier College Prep and ASU, graduating with honors. She later became an apprentice tattoo artist and now hones her trade in Northern California.

Pike taught Christian the things she imagined he would have learned from his father, Michael, like shooting and working on cars. She also sent him to "Outward Bound" each summer to bond with others and push his limits. She beamed, "He never doubted himself. He felt he was capable of anything."

Christian enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 2001 and was also drawn to intelligence. In March 2013, he was mortally wounded during a fierce gun battle in Afghanistan. Diana found herself in Germany again, but this time in Landstuhl, to say goodbye to her only son, Cryptologist Tech Chief Christian Pike. "It never occurred to me that he wouldn't come home—until I got that phone call." The Gold Star Mom said her son loved his life, and she's grateful they left nothing unsaid.

Diana Pike earned her undergraduate degree from Hood College and her graduate degree from Western Internation in Phoenix. She retired from FOX News after 21 years as a Regional Director for Human Resources.



Jim Symonds

Admiral Jim Symonds

Rear Admiral Jim Symonds is a retired veteran who has 35 years of service in the U.S. Navy. He was a Naval Flight Officer and Naval Aviator with 18 years of flying service in three operational A-6 Intruder squadrons with deployments on four different aircraft carriers.

As a Flag Officer, he was first assigned to the Chief of Naval Operations Staff in Washington, DC, where he was the Navy's Director of Environmental Readiness (N45). As Commanding Officer of the USS Ronald Reagan, he was invited to render the honors of the casket flag of President Ronald Reagan to his wife Nancy Reagan.

His last tour of duty was as Commander, Navy Region Northwest in Silverdale, WA. He oversaw 3,000 Sailors and civilians, providing strategic planning and daily operations at four central Navy installations in Washington state.

Dale Villani is the President of the Board of Honoring America's Veterans (HAV), a local nonprofit that hosts large-scale special events to pay tribute to our nation's veterans. Some of their events include the Phoenix Veterans Day Parade, now in its 28th year, the Commemorating Pearl Harbor Day Ceremony, the Honor Our Heroes Veterans Grand Marshals program, and, new this year, the Memorial Day Program in partnership with the VA.

Dale brings a wealth of experience to his role. With over 43 years of healthcare leadership under his belt, Dale has served in various capacities, including at Aetna, Sun Health Corporation, Dignity Health, and Magellan Health Services. His career also includes a distinguished tenure as a lieutenant colonel with the U.S. Air Force Medical Service Corps. Dale's academic achievements are equally impressive, with an MBA from Penn State and a lifetime Fellowship with the American College of Healthcare Executives.

Dale and his wife Amy live in Scottsdale and have two daughters, a grandson, and two rescue dogs. In his spare time, Dale enjoys outdoor activities, including golf, hiking, and fishing.





Rick Romley

Master of Ceremonies: Judge of the Veteran's Court, Rick Romley

Rick Romley served four elected terms as the Maricopa County Attorney [1989-2004] and was appointed interim Maricopa County Attorney in 2010. He has testified before the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives on the issues of violent crime, terrorism, drug trafficking, youth violence, public corruption, and victims' rights. During his stellar career as County Attorney, he earned over 100 awards.

Romley joined the United States Marine Corps as a combat infantry squad leader in Vietnam until wounded in 1969. He received numerous commendations, including the Purple Heart. In 2001, Romley received two additional National Awards for his service in defense of our country: Life's Presidential Unsung Hero Award and America>s Outstanding Disabled American Veteran of the Year.

Romley was inducted into the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame in 2007. Romley and his wife, Carol, live in Scottsdale, Arizona.

SEMPER SUPRA, SPACE FORCE HYMN (ALWAYS ABOVE)


We're the mighty watchful eye,
